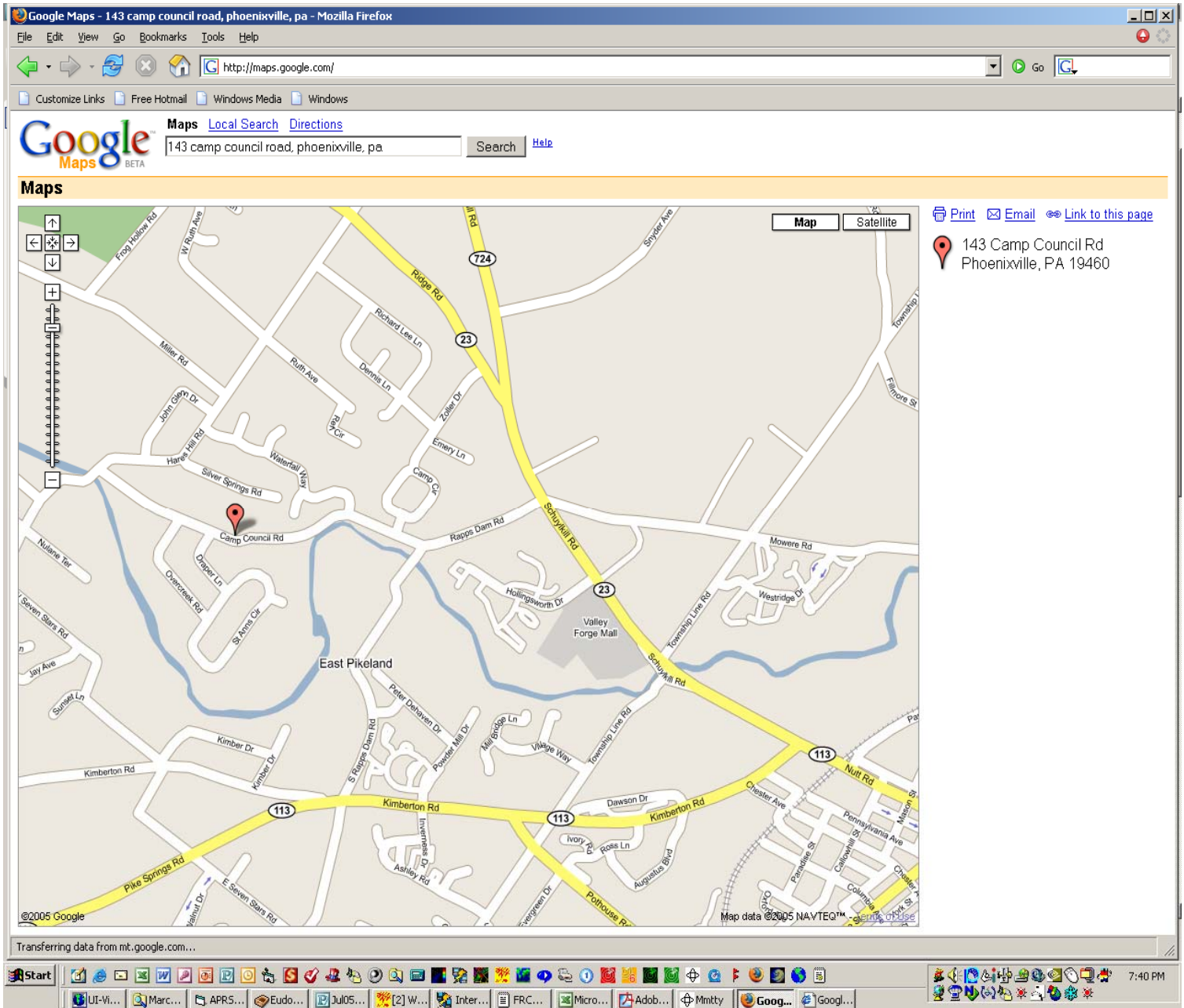
- 1) **PLEASE** make **ALL** checks payable to **FRANKFORD RADIO CLUB, and NOT KQ2M.**

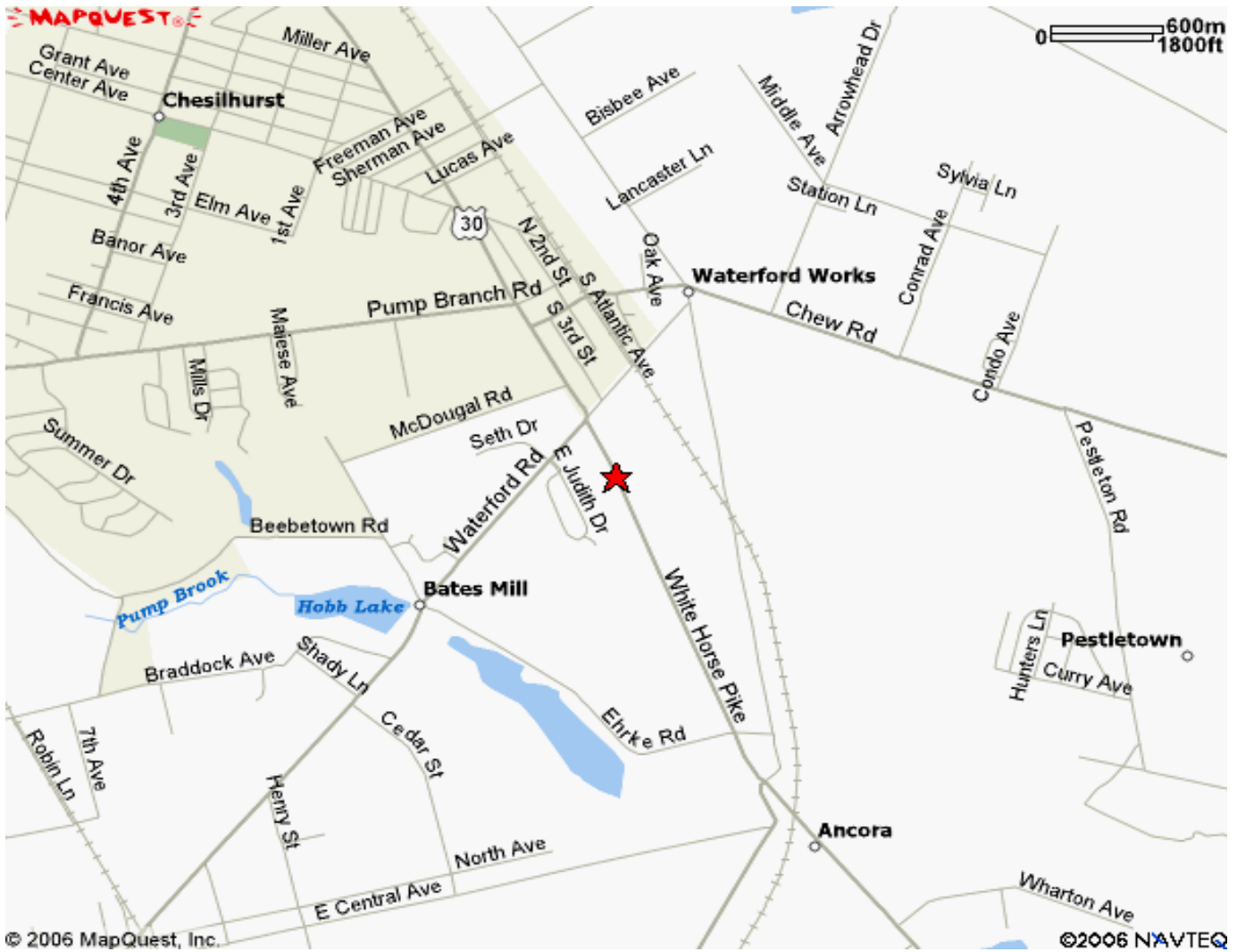
FRC SUMMER MEETING AT N3RD

From the East: Take your favorite route (Schuylkill Expressway or PA Turnpike) to Valley Forge, and then proceed on Rt. 23 West toward Phoenixville. Stay on Rt. 23, all the way through Phoenixville, making sure that you stay right and continue straight at the spot where Rt. 113 veers off to the left. After Rt. 113 veers off, turn left at the third traffic light. This will be just after a Burger King on the right. Tips on Field Checking QSL cards for DXCC

DXCC Field Card Checker -- EPA

I have been a “field checker” for the ARRL DXCC, VUCC and WAS awards for about 5 or 6 years. I have not had too many “customers” for the WAS and VUCC awards, although I recently did a VUCC application for John, W3HMS for 1296 MHz (23 cm), and that was really neat. Included were Grids in EPA, MDC and then VK and EU via EME! The focus of this article will be on the DXCC award.

I seem to see the same errors when checking QSL cards for the DXCC award. I encourage you to read the rules carefully before you start preparing your paperwork. The rules can be found on the ARRL web site under “on the air” and then under “awards”. QSL cards must be listed by band, then by mode. For example, all 40 Meter CW cards are listed, then 40 Meter Phone, 20 Meter CW, 20 Meter Phone, etc. Multi-band and or multi-mode cards are listed at the end of the application as a group. After sorting by band and mode, the cards are to be listed in order by the prefix, NOT the country name! An example would be 3A2, 4X4, 5N7, A25, CN8, DL5, etc. This order is determined by the official DXCC Country List which, again, is found on the ARRL web site. Don’t let special or odd prefixes confuse you. The DXCC Country list is your guide. CN falls in place in the order, regardless of the actual prefix (such as 5C5) that you may have worked in Morocco. The name of the country is listed on the far right column of the form. This is very important. Again, these listings are within the band and mode, meaning that you go back to the start of the list each time you change bands and/or modes on the list. Incorrect presentation on the paperwork is cause for rejection of the application and I don’t want to do that!

I am often asked if one can submit their paperwork from a logging program or using an Excel spread sheet of their own design. The answer to this is yes, provided it “mirrors” the official submission form, again found on the ARRL web site.

If you are submitting multi-band/mode cards, for example, you worked K5D on 6 bands and 3 modes, this card is listed at the very end of the application using as many lines for which you are seeking credit. If you are not seeking credit for all QSO’s on a card, simply put a yellow stick’em on the card that says 40 Meter CW only, or such. When you are doing a submission face to face with the checker, it is a little easier to indicate such information verbally. Don’t forget that it is your responsibility to provide the checker with a stamped, addressed envelope to the ARRL DXCC desk, so the checker can send in the paperwork.. The paperwork will not be given back to you after the session, the checker must physically mail the paperwork. Personally, I prefer if the person gives me \$2.00 to cover the postage, as I use large envelopes that I have on hand. Seven or eight sheets of paper jammed into a number 10 envelope doesn’t make good sense.

Your checker will help you complete the application form. I suggest leaving the form blank, other than your name, address, call, etc. The checker can fill in the needed information when the process is complete and you have discussed your desires for endorsements, bands, modes, etc. with the checker.

Some of this information may seem basic, but I see errors frequently, involving exactly what I have written about. Field checkers are available to answer your questions and will be happy to do so.

Remember, field checkers cannot check deleted countries or 160 Meter cards! They must be submitted directly to the ARRL DXCC Desk for checking.

FRC Regional Directors

At the last policy committee Ray, **N9RS**, asked me to coordinate the appointment of **FRC** regional directors.

The regional director will have two main responsibilities. First: to work with current members to achieve maximum contest participation. This could include finding seats for those without a place to operate and to fill seats for those multi stations needing operators and to simply encourage (coerce) everyone to get on and stay in the chair. This would be coordinated with Doug, **W3CF** who has been maintaining the **FRC** Op List for each contest.

The second responsibility will involve seeking out new members. This could involve identifying hams in the area that might enjoy getting involved in contesting. Perhaps some of you who just participated in Field Day might have seen some candidates. Another avenue would be identifying non-members in the **FRC** area who have participated in contests – either from our logs or from submitted scores. CQ and ARRL both maintain a list of submitted scores, so this could be done long before the scores are published.

Dale, **N3BNA** has done all of this successfully in **FRC** - West, including organizing periodic informal get-togethers (officially a meeting) either in a restaurant or at someone's house, although these meetings may not be appropriate in all areas.

As we go to press, these guys have graciously volunteered to be regional directors. We expect to fill some other areas soon. If anyone wishes to volunteer, just let me know.. The designations of the areas are not firm, so if you would like to volunteer and define your area differently, just let me know, In any case, there are no fixed boundaries

When you're working away on your antenna system this summer, don't forget to use a small amount of anti-oxidation compound in aluminum-to-aluminum joints. Two of the better known and widely available brands are Penetrox and Noaxlox. Either or both may be available at your local hardware emporia and the latter is available from [RadioShack](#).

The shoveling, troweling, and cleaning are over - how long must you wait for that new tower base to be strong enough to get busy with the antenna work? Jim W6RMK has the answer, "28 days is when the concrete will have reached its "data sheet" spec. It still keeps getting stronger for years. You're [at] about 50% of the 28-day strength in 7 days. You MUST keep the surface wet for the entire cure time." Wet cloths such as old sheets from the thrift store or plastic sheeting with water sprayed underneath can be keep the surface damp. Jim also provided this reference, the Federal Highway Administration's "[Guide for curing of portland cement pavements](#)".

The recent brouhaha over 2009 IARU HF Championship logs from DAØHQ has been addressed by the ARRL as the administrator of the contest. The full statement is online at the [ARRL Contest Branch blog](#). In a nutshell, while individual German amateurs may have violated the rule of one-call-per-transmitter in making many questionable QSOs, there is no evidence that the DAØHQ team solicited that behavior. As a result, no overall winner's certificate will be awarded for the 2009 contest - only continental leaders certificates. More importantly, effective with the 2010 contest, HQ logs will not be adjudicated, nor will scores for HQ stations be published. All logs may be made public at the discretion of the contest administrator, i.e. the ARRL. HQ stations will continue to be multipliers in the contest.

Thanks to [Dean N6BV's Propagation Predictions software](#), there is a new set of [customized propagation forecasts](#) for WRTC-2010 participants. Inside the ZIP file there are four PDFs for Very Low SSN and Low SSN conditions at 100 and 1500 watts. This will help you find the WRTC stations (R3ØA-R39Z) just as well as it helps them find you! With the event just a month in the future, this is good information to help everyone prepare to participate effectively. (Thanks, Bob N6TV)

Where Does It Go Next?

As WRTC-2010 approaches the question arises, as it always does, of "Where does WRTC go next?" While our primary focus needs to remain on enjoying and supporting WRTC-2010, it is encouraging to note the interest of the international community in the future of World Radiosport Team Championship. How is the WRTC flame passed from group to group? How is the application made? Who makes the decision?

Answering the last question first, the WRTC Sanctioning Committee (WRTC-SC) is made up of representatives from the preceding WRTC sponsors and host committees, led by WRTC-2000 committee chair, Tine Brajnik S5ØA. The Sanctioning Committee is responsible for evaluating applications from potential sponsors. The rights to host the event as a WRTC are then awarded to the selected group. The WRTC-SC is only responsible for awarding hosting rights and is not a "steering committee" in charge of rules or procedures - those details are left to the hosts.

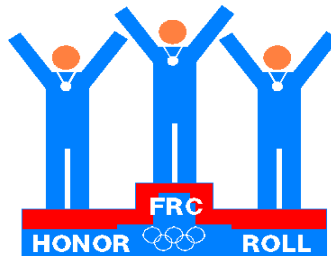
The application process begins with a query to the WRTC-SC by an interested person or group who then receives a set of WRTC goals, requirements, and guidelines. The potential sponsors must agree to meet the requirements and pledge a good faith effort to conduct the event so as to further WRTC goals and follow the WRTC guidelines. An introduction to the sponsoring organization and its leadership team should be provided along with a broad description of the proposed event. It is not necessary to submit a detailed proposal for the event at this early date.

There follows a sequence of communications and meetings with the applying group. This refines the event proposal, clarifies requirements to the applicants, and further demonstrates to the WRTC-SC the capabilities of the potential sponsors. At the conclusion of this process, the WRTC-SC is confident that the sponsors are willing and able to take on the job of conducting a WRTC and makes the announcement of the award. Once the award is made, the WRTC-SC is available to assist the sponsoring committee, but promoting and conducting the WRTC is up to the new hosts.

Sponsors for the 1996 and 2000 events in California and Slovenia were announced after the previous event was over. At the conclusion of each WRTC since 2000, the home of the next WRTC - Finland, Brazil, Russia - has been announced to applause and gratitude from the assembled hosts, competitors, judges, and spectators. Will there be a similar announcement in Moscow for WRTC-2014? We shall see! While interest has been expressed in hosting WRTC-2014, the Sanctioning Committee has not yet received a formal application and is therefore anxiously waiting to hear from a group wishing to organize the next great worldwide event. In order that we might discuss it before WRTC-2010, the WRTC-SC should receive the request by the end of June. Please contact any of the members of the WRTC SC listed below.

Brothers and sisters - enjoy WRTC-2010 and the hospitality of its hosts! Acknowledge the years of work undertaken on behalf of all of us. Consider what they have accomplished, as well as the preceding five WRTC hosts of the past two decades, in establishing a tradition of competition among friends. What better way to support that tradition than by insuring it continues?
